<u>**Treasurer's Report:**</u> It was noted that deposits exceeded bills to be paid for the month. Motions approved to accept October financial reports.

#### **Old Business**

**Part-time office staff update:** There is a need for approximately four additional hours each pay period to accomplish the office work.

**Nominating committee report:** One council position and one nominating committee position remain open. Gary will speak during worship on Nov. 15 to invite people to consider these positions.

**Hiring Policy:** There will be a vote to approve the hiring policy document at the December council meeting. Copies to be sent by email, and hard copies will be on hand for council members.

**Constitution Update:** The St. Andrew's Constitution from 1991 is being compared with the model Constitution provided by the ELCA. This work is continuing by the committee. **Budget:** There is concern that the estimated income will not be realized. There is a need for a communication strategy for the congregation to increase church income. The budget for staffing for 2016 was discussed with concern for the deficit presented. The suggestion was made to create a narrative budget for the staff to enable the congregation to see both the expense side and the work accomplished by the staff. **Abel Scholarship for 2016:** Motion approved to give \$500 to

a qualifying student from UW-O, and \$500 to a qualifying student from Ripon College. Students must be juniors majoring in performing arts, with the colleges deciding the recipients. An invitation is extended to the scholarship recipients to consider performing at St. Andrew's.

#### New Business

#### **Committee Reports**

**Fellowship:** Chris Ziegler thanked all who helped provide the All Saints' Sunday lunch. Between 115 and 120 people are signed up to attend the November  $15^{\text{th}}$  dinner.

**Property:** <u>Old Business:</u> Continuing to look at carpet/tile replacement in the sanctuary. We have \$8,603 inn special funds, with a total need of \$13,000. The bathrooms have been re-painted. A new vacuum has been requested. Quotes will be gotten for adding a restroom on southwest side of building. <u>New Business</u>: Discussed using portable display boards. Auto entry doors to be installed Wed., Nov. 25. Cost of the new

hearing loop is \$7,450. Paul Wolf will replace the broken kitchen faucet. Art work is being hung by the Décor committee. Who should change the church sign messages? Gary Bruce will speak to the congregation on Nov. 15 about the hearing loop and the new sanctuary carpeting. Stewardship: Moving forward with stewardship plans. Worship & Music: We have started publishing personal stories of congregational involvement in the newsletter. Prints of Peace service is Nov. 7, Prayer Around the Cross is on Nov. 11. The choir will sing with other Lutheran choir members at the Nov. 22 Interfaith Festival of Gratitude at the Grand Opera House. The Blue Christmas worship service will be Dec. 23. **Youth:** The Senior High Youth Gather is Nov. 13 – 15. Five youth are attending. There will be a family meeting for the summer trip to set the date and discuss fundraising. Amish candy will be sold at Christmas. The youth have been working on art for the Art Gala for 2016. They are also working on making a video. In October the youth group went to Little Farmer and had such a good time! They met up with a group from Bethel Lutheran Church in Green Bay. Our kids showed them what it's like to be young, caring Christian people. They really included the younger kids and I couldn't be more proud of them. We also had Confirmation lock-in. There were 8 YMT kids and 8 Confirmation kids. A scavenger hunt was held throughout the church, and the youth learned where the Eternal light was located. Two QPR training sessions were held here at church and one at Bethel Lutheran Church. Pastor's Report: On Oct. 15, I attend the Faith Leader's luncheon in Appleton covering a new mental health care initiative – designed to educate and equip church leaders to support care for folks with mental health needs. Deep thanks to members of St. Andrew's who provided refreshments and hospitality for the memorial reception for Betty Young, and for the funeral for Larry Laabs, and for the open house at Emmeline Cook elementary school in October. Nov. 1 – deep thanks to all the members who took part in the congregational photo on All Saints' Day and for those who cooked, served, and took part in the fellowship lunch. It was a very happy gathering and the photos by Peg Olson and Patty Koplitz are beautiful!

Nov. 7 – Fall Clean-up Day was a great day – members of all ages took part. Thank you to Gary and Darlene Bruce for organizing it and then feeding us!

### We cherish children and youth at St Andrew's

<sup>40</sup>One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother.<sup>41</sup>He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed). <sup>42</sup>He brought Simon to Jesus... (John 1:40-42)

A St Andrew's Day devotion from my seminary in Columbus, Ohio told the story of a quiet saint in a congregation who had nurtured the children in the congregation over the years – she taught Sunday School, and she invited children by turns to sit with her in worship.

Here's the story in the author's own words: Mary Smith was my preschool Sunday school teacher. Each week she lovingly taught us about Jesus through flannel-graph Bible stories, finger plays and songs. Mrs. Smith also had what I have come to label as a "back pew ministry." Each week she selected and invited certain children to sit with her each Sunday during worship. Mrs. Smith had a special bag full of things that keep young children busy – coloring pages, puzzles, and word searches. In that bag was the most beautiful (in my young child's mind) gold mesh pot metal coin purse that contained coins for offering that each of us got to contribute to the passed plate.

Mary Smith never accepted any praise for her work nor was she given any accolades, to my knowledge. Mrs. Smith simply lived out her Christian faith by doing what God called her to do ministry with children. Mary Smith was an Andrew – she faithfully pointed us to Jesus and brought us into his loving presence. She loved, encouraged, and prayed for "her" kids all her life... (Rev Dr Pamela Challis)

There are some among us who do just the same kind of ministry. We have deeply generous and devoted Sunday School teachers, helpers and our wonderful superintendent, Michele Hawley. They work with our children from the age of 3 through fifth grade.

We have a wonderful Youth Leadership Facilitator, Patty Koplitz, who works faithfully to invite, gather, and empower our children from 3<sup>rd</sup> grade on. She helps make St Andrew's a safe place for our youth and children: a welcoming place for their questions of faith and growing up into their gifts from God.

We have marvelous teachers and parents who have shepherded our confirmation students (grades  $6^{th}$  to  $8^{th}$ ) through the studies and practice of faith to prepare them to make their faith confession as young adults and continue in faithful living.

And we have those quiet folks whose ministry may never be "public" but who know those names, encourage those wonderful young souls to know they are loved and cherished in God's house.

It does make a difference. You make a difference.

In our recent staff evaluations we talked about **challenging all of our adults to become "Andrew" for our children and youth.** What do you think that would look like in you? The first step, of course, is to ask God to help us see the children with Jesus' eyes.

The next steps might include praising a child or youth who has taken leadership – as an usher, a reader, a singer, helping in whatever way. And we can walk up to our children and youth in fellowship and say hi and ask what is going on in their lives.

**You make a difference** – you are Andrew , too – helping someone find the love of Christ is here for them – and is for them always.

Beyond your friendship and mentoring, our congregation uses your offering gifts to place bibles in the hands of every child from three years old and on up. Your gifts fund our Sunday School, our Confirmation program, our youth activities and the leadership to accomplish all this.

**Thank you so much!** And by the way, Happy St Andrew's Day (November 30<sup>th</sup>) and many happy returns of the day!

### A word of Grace about Advent practices

We all want to do more for good health and wellbeing but Oh! how to make it work in daily life!

So I found this word of grace from Pastor Rachel Hackenberg, who offers daily prompts for prayer during Advent to be especially helpful. I pass it along to you:

P.S. Sunday is the first day of Advent, and once again during this Advent season I will email daily prayer prompts to you and post daily prayers on my blog. Two quick notes in preparation:

(1) I recognize that daily emails can feel overwhelming, and sometimes we find ourselves feeling guilty for not keeping up with daily prayer. Please extend grace to yourself and know that these prompts are not intended to provoke guilt but to provide a pause for prayer. If it helps, file the emails that you don't read immediately and return to them when you need an unscheduled prayer prompt.

(2) If your email is anything like mine during the holidays, each day holds a plethora of emails filled with advertising. Remember that this email offers what advertising emails don't: an invitation to refocus your spirit amidst the holiday noise. So while I encourage you to give yourself grace as needed, I also hope that you'll give yourself the time & space needed to nurture your spirit during this busy season. Best wishes for Advent!

## Want to leave a mark in Luther Land?

St. Andrew's can be a part of the Luthergarten in Wittenberg,

Germany! Luthergarten is a park-like setting of 500 trees being created to represent religious communities and denominations from around the world. The design recreates the shape of the Luther Rose.

In 2017, Wittenberg, Germany will be the center of the celebration of the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation. This park, sponsored by the Lutheran World Federation, will be a focal point for the celebration of the life and work of Martin Luther.

A tree will be planted in the Luthergarten in St. Andrew's name, with a plaque identifying it as "our" tree. A "companion" tree will be planted here at St. Andrew's representing our partnership with faith communities around the world. \$1200 is needed to purchase and plant the trees and plaques.
