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Dear friends,

Unsung heroes are working hard for you and for your church. I am thinking of our wonderful council members and staff members, who are jumping into all sorts of work to support and improve our life together.

At the last council meeting we looked over our finances and began the process of developing narrative budgets for the upcoming year of mission and ministry.

Our council and staff will submit the narrative budgets to the finance committee in September so that they can compile our overall budget for 2016. This will be the budget you will vote on at the Annual Meeting in January.

It is easy to get quite worried about our finances whether it is at home or at church. You know how we all work up close with the numbers and try to wring the most out of each penny we spend or invest.

But that view can make us short-sighted or even blind to the miracle present before us.

Take our church finances. We struggle to balance and carefully steward the costs of staffing, equipping and maintaining our congregation and our physical campus. All done to support worship, education and outreach.

We always run into worrisome days in the summer when our income drops along with the drop in attendance at worship. (Members travel and are busy elsewhere!)

But when we get worried, we need to **look back** and **look up** to see the miracle of our very existence!

This congregation is housed in a building and on land that was purchased, cleared, built and maintained by the blood, sweat, tears and gifts of people.

**Look back** at the initial work of the mission-developer pastor that was funded by gifts of money given by people who would never even see St Andrew's!

We received a pastor, capital, blueprints and plans to get it all started! The gifts touched so many hearts that families and individuals organized the initial congregation and worshipped in the basement of the Shoreview Lanes bowling alley for two years until they could build their first church building here.

You know it wasn't only money that built us up – but also the care given to toddlers, to the faithful teaching of children, youth and adults, to the gathering in choir, fellowship and mission.

I like to share with new members that every drop of paint, every brick, every bible and every hour of worship have been given to us by others in Jesus' name!

Looking back helps us find a balance again – restores our confidence when diminished financial resources might make us worry. Look how far we have come!

We also need to **look up** daily to the one who inspired all the gifts that formed this congregation and built the house we gather in. A house that is not ours but has been entrusted to us by God through the love of those who came before us.

We look up and reconnect with the grace that makes each day full of life. All of our yesterdays, every moment of today, and all of our tomorrows are sheer GIFTS from the one who gives faithfully and abundantly.

We look back and reconnect with the gifts that brought us this far, we look up and reconnect with the grace that makes life beautiful each day, and that restores our vision.

Now we may look beyond our fears in faith. We can see the places where we are called to act faithfully, love generously, and inspire others to turn in trust to the Lord Jesus Christ – our Alpha and Omega, our beginning and our final home.

Thank you for the gifts you bring in Jesus' name.

July 14, 2015

**Financial Reports-**

*Monthly Bills and Financial Reports* - The June monthly bills and reports were presented and approved.

*Closing of the Anchor Bank on Main Street.*

Matt thanked Jayne Lindsay for the work she did researching alternative banks. We will be switching over to US Bank August 1, 2015.

**Old Business**

*Part time Office Secretary Position* - The full time secretarial position shared by Kay and Sandy ended July 4th. Both ladies have agreed to split the part time position so each will work 10 hours a week. The sick time and vacation time will be divided between them. The holiday pay will be given to the person who would have worked that day.

*Luther Garden Tree* - Last fall the idea of sponsoring a tree in Germany in the Luther Garden was tabled until spring. Sandy brought this forward at this time. The congregation could sponsor a tree to be planted in the Luther Garden representing our church. A similar tree could be planted on our grounds in honor of the sponsored tree. The total cost is approximately \$1000 for both trees. The motion was made by Peg and seconded by Kristi for the council to support efforts to raise money for this endeavor.

*Building Safety/Security* - Pastor brought forward several instances in which church doors were not closed and/or locked, windows left open, lights left on and in one case an oven was left on for over a day. These are major concerns for building safety and security. All council members were asked to be especially diligent in securing the building when leaving. Matt indicated that for a small fee an alarm system could be added that would alert if someone enters the building between a set time (e.g. 12 midnight and 6 AM). Matt was asked to bring a proposal to the August meeting for further discussion.

**New Business**

*Sharing of 2015 Goals* - Each council member gave a brief report on their 2015 goals and their progress toward reaching those goals.

*2016 Goals* - Jane suggested that council members begin engaging their committee members in the development of the 2016 goals and Narrative Budgets now. Narrative

Budget discussions will begin at the September 9th meeting.

*Revising the Constitution and Bylaws* - Jayne Lindsay, Jakob and Matt have agreed to work with Jane on the revision of our current Constitution and Bylaws.

*Replacement TV* A motion was made and approved that a new TV be purchased to replace the broken TV on the VCR cart.

*Sexuality and the Church* - Pastor shared that a homosexual couple has approached her to perform a wedding ceremony. The ELCA has ruled that such ceremonies can be conducted with the support of the church. She also shared that we have always been a welcoming church and accepted same sex partners into our congregation. Before agreeing to officiate over any wedding all couples must demonstrate they are in a committed relationship and that they hold Christian values. She is willing to officiate over a same sex ceremony but is asking for the support of the church council leadership. After discussion the motion that the council support Pastor in officiating same sex weddings was carried by a unanimous vote. After further discussion the motion to allow same sex marriage ceremonies to be performed in the church was approved.

**Committee Reports**

***Education-*** Looking for a Chairperson

***Technology-*** Sermons are being recorded and put on the website, as well as a packet created with the week's bulletin and a CD with a recording of the sermon for Pastor to take to homebound members. The next steps in creating a web/social media committee were discussed. A new internet router has been installed. Next Meeting: September 1, 2015 at 10:00 AM

***Worship and Music-*** An agenda was created for the August 4 (9 am – 4 pm) committee retreat.

***President Report:*** - Jane is reviewing our current insurance policy and obtaining quotes from other vendors. Jane has developed a policy on hiring to be reviewed by the Executive Committee prior to presenting to the Council. She will also be working with Pastor and the Custodian on development of a job description. Eventually all paid positions will have a job description.

***Pastor's Report:*** - A motion made and carried to accept Brian and Sherri Wolc as new members.

### Back to School Time!!!

#### Let's share our faith, Let's read our bibles.

We feel excited for all those who are beginning and returning to school. Even those of us long out of the direct experience of school days can find excitement in a new notebook and a freshly sharpened pencil!

Lutherans love the bible and we are life-long learners so we are always encouraged to go “back to school” and study our bibles.

But how will we do it? It can seem daunting to jump in and begin. And do we have to do it alone?

Never! God promises the guidance of the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, for our bible study, our prayers and all of our living!

**ASAP:** Always Say A Prayer.

We can begin by praying that God will light our way into this new study, and grant us understanding of the bible words that we read. Take a deep breath and ask for God's help.

*O God, heavenly Father, we thank you for the Word you give us in Jesus Christ. Help us to open our bibles with understanding, to hear your love speaking to us, and to see how we may live your truth in our lives today. We ask this humbly in Jesus' name. Amen.*

Some people like to read the bible from cover to cover beginning with the book of Genesis and ending with the Book of Revelation.

It is rather like reading all the books on a shelf from one end of the shelf to the other – because the bible has 66 books between the two covers.

So you may want to start with one of the books that tells an adventure story – the Book of **Jonah** which

begins with a whale (or great fish) and ends with Jonah on a hilltop above Nineveh, hoping for fire and brimstone to rain down from the sky. It is only four chapters long but it is very humorous and has helped people for long years not to take themselves too seriously!

Or perhaps you would like to read a lovely romance with a very happy ending: the Book of **Ruth** tells in four short chapters the story of a foreigner who shows faithfulness to her mother-in-law and her God and so becomes a part of Jesus' family tree.

Perhaps you could set yourself the goal of one psalm per day – there are 150 **Psalms** in the prayer book at the center of the bible: prayers and songs that run the gamut of all our faith quandaries and all our human emotions! Psalm 23 is well-known even to folks who have never read the bible!

I like to recommend that we start with a gospel – you have four to choose from: **Matthew, Mark, Luke** or **John**. Each tells the story of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, sharing his words of teaching and encouragement, his stories and his disciples' questions for him. Reading a gospel is a great way to get better acquainted with the Lord we try to follow day by day.

If Pastor Karen can be of any help – with your reading of the bible or your faith questions, please ask. We have copies of the bible to share, and many great resources for your studies.

For Christians bible reading is like brushing your teeth – when you brush regularly your teeth will serve you for life! So also brush up your faith!

Luther wrote this to encourage us to read the bible: *These are the Scriptures which make fools of all the wise and understanding, and are open only to the small and simple, as Christ says in Matthew 11:25. Therefore dismiss your own opinions and feelings, and think of the scriptures as the loftiest and noblest of holy things, as the richest of mines which can never be sufficiently explored, in order that you may find divine wisdom which God here lays before you in such simple guise as to quench all pride. Here you will find the swaddling clothes and the manger in which Christ lies.* -- Martin Luther, Luther's Works, vol. 35: Prefaces to the Old Testament, 236.
