Dear friends.

Remember the expression *same old*, *same old*, that meant there was nothing new under the sun and things seem a bit boring right now? Did you ever think how much we would long for same old, same old things? No, me either!

During this challenging time, we are in the midst of grief from losses and changes – almost a homesickness for what we were used to doing.

Although being in grief doesn't mean that we stop living, it does mean that we need to make room for what the bible would call "lament" both in ourselves and with each other.

Right now, I frequently kick myself for mistakes I thought I could have avoided. The fatigue, the distractions, the longing for certainty about things that are good, all factor into my performance of the most routine stuff of work and life.

Kicking ourselves doesn't help much, but taking time to name what is bothering our hearts may set us free to forgive, to find comfort, and to renew the energy to tackle what is challenging us.

Do you take time each day for yourself? Do you take time for a prayer, a word from the bible, a time with the God who loves you? How about writing a request for God's help or praying a psalm to express your deep longing for renewed life and freedom.

This psalm is a classic lament – and we can easily fill in the blank of who is the enemy by picturing that nasty, vicious little virus that has brought on so much trouble and fear: COVID-19.

#### Psalm 13

<sup>1</sup>How long, O LORD? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? <sup>2</sup>How long must I bear pain in my soul, and have sorrow in my heart all day long? How long shall my enemy be exalted over me? <sup>3</sup>Consider and answer me, O LORD my God! Give light to my eyes, or I will sleep the sleep of death, <sup>4</sup>and my enemy will say, "I have prevailed"; my foes will rejoice because I am shaken. <sup>5</sup>But I trusted in your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in your salvation. <sup>6</sup>I will sing to the LORD, because he has dealt bountifully with me.

One of the best things about a lament psalm is the ending; almost always a lament psalm ends with a recalling of the good that God has done in the past so that we have hope in the present about what God will bring us to again – life, freedom, well-being, peace.

So many of my previous columns for this newsletter in September have been about school and all the wonderful feelings I associate with a new school year.

I think this one will be good too, but so different. It will be good in the ways that God makes things good. God draws blessings out of the strangest things! We can expect blessings and we will be travelling with a God who loves us through it all.

This year we have talked with our education folks and determined it would be best for our families to have time to adjust to whatever this school year brings through school before we launch our Sunday School, Confirmation and other endeavors.

We will work into the autumn with gentleness for all those who are grieving the differences right now and with confidence in the love of God to bring us to new things that are good.

And I hold you in my heart. And I thank you. Your faithfulness brings the love of God and God's blessings of life so needed by our community. May God bless and comfort you always! Yours in Christ,

# Treasurer's report Profit and Loss Budget Performance:

Total operational income of \$10,516.22 in July

Total expense of \$11,773.14 in July Negative net income of \$1,256.92

Typical summer month position for us

### **Profit and Loss Previous Year Comparison:**

Operationally we are up \$12,000.00 year to date compared to last year.

Up \$15,592.59 for this year at this time. Last year at this time we were down \$8,000.00.

So our report of a negative \$1200.00 is not concerning but something to be aware of.

### **Balance Sheet Previous Year Comparison:**

A couple of key things here: our money market as of July 31st is \$135,000.00

And we are now seeing expenses coming in on the ADA bathroom

Up until the end of July beginning of August we have been able to use existing operational funds to pay for that

Now we have had to dip into our money market – in July we took \$5,000.00 out of the money market and in August thus far, had to take \$15,000.00. At lot of those are expenses related to the ADA bathroom, but it is withdrawals we were forced to take.

Current liabilities – we did get a letter from UWO requesting confirmation that we are going to give our donation this year. That is approved by us and we will send out check by some time in September.

Special Renovation fund (ADA restroom project) - \$24,497.02. At Monday's Worship and Tech Comm mtg, Steve Last indicated that the project may come in about \$3,000.00 under budget. We have paid out \$20,900.00 so far. Expecting

about another \$17,000.00 to come through for bills for the project.

### Bill to be paid:

Expenses organized by committee \$21,841.15 Expenses \$7,708.39 Payroll

\$29,549.54 Total expenses for the month \$11,747.88 income – therefore needed to take \$15,000.00 from money market

Our giving has been pretty consistent on the Vanco (electronic) side, so not concerned. A lot of these expenses are associated with the ADA Bathroom project, and that's what the funds are for sitting in that account (Special Renovation Fund).

Motion made and passed to approve the report and the bills to be paid.

### Old Business New Business

### Planning for re-opening – discussion

Our offerings are not the same when we don't have in-person worship, a bit challenging! On the other hand, we don't want to be stampeded into opening in such a way that puts our members at risk. How do you feel about the time frame. Today I watched a webinar – COVID-19 Science for Churches. Only takes 15 minutes to get the maximum dose of viral particles, and most of our worship services are at least 30 minutes, so being inside together is a risk – may want to think about timing – do we want to start in September? Watch the situation of schools in September – maybe poll our members before starting in-person worship inside. Is it safe and advisable? Many churches postponing it for more months, others are already conducting in-person, inside worship.

Q: How long can we think about doing the outdoor worship? Though September?

A: If terrible weather (inclement) then cancelled, but we can't just move it indoors. But we could think about doing it as long as we can.

First outdoor worship on August 23. Maybe, Bless the Pets on the 30<sup>th</sup>?

Should we announce to the congregation that we will offer outdoor worship as long as weather holds? Consensus – Yes.

Continue to do virtual worship at 9 am (Facebook) 10:30 am would be the outdoor worship. Would this work? Try it for the time being.

How many can attend? As long as people can physically distance and wear masks, bring own lawn chairs if possible – set up sound system under overhang of pavilion. Family groups can be together but six feet apart from other families or individuals.

Usher to help people be 6 feet apart, no passing of the plate. Can still do a bulletin as long as it is not shared – so it doesn't become a source of transmission. Not handling each other's bulletins, communion or offering plate.

Can't sing – it is not recommended at all. Recorded music is OK, but not congregational singing. Ushers could wear gloves to handout the bulletins or lay them on chairs. Offering tray fixed but not passed. Anyone who does the counting should wear gloves. Can't have counters in the counting room – have to find a safe way to process this.

Church would not be open for gathering or passing through. Difficult because it flies in the face of all our hospitality. Everyone needs to understand if the weather is inclement, the worship is cancelled – can't be moved inside.

Link for the COVID Science for Churches as soon as available – will be sent to the council, the Task Force and the Worship Committee.

Q: Begin inside Sept 17?

A: We need to see how it goes with schools resuming in-person.

Covenant of care for others on the first page of bulletins, and in the welcoming at start of service. Offering communion as departing – and also for drive up communion in parking lot. (Home visits also available with pastor on front porch or yard to maintain safe distance.)

Have a flier or poster to help people know? Q how to notify everybody – in the NET a week ahead, and we could call or send postcard to those who do not receive the NET. (Encourage people to people contacts!)

Drive up communion designated for specific time.

**Dedication of our renovations (Virtual)** – video walk through, and then have our prayers of dedication – like a house blessing.

# Cooperative Ministry Planning for worship, education, fellowship

Worship and technology mtg yesterday - trying to make sure we have the technology to support the mission goals for worship, education and fellowship. Get these committees together – to invite people to work together on this.

Synod Education video webinar – with Dawn Rundman and Pastor Dara Clifford – get links to Carol Sp from Synod newsletter. Involve the youth in the dev of videos, leading, etc.

Padcaster – I-pad recording for worship and for education videos, perhaps use memorial funds to purchase this kind of technology. Record, edit and send out – all in one.

Ask for a Task Force to recommend the best resources to support our goals.

### Pastor's report to council

**Education** – synod webinar with Dawn Rundman of 1517 Media. It is available on-line for those who could not attend. It is highly recommended that we offer a video component and a hands-on component (faith kits) for our children and youth.

(e.g. Advent in a box <a href="https://buildfaith.org/advent-in-a-box/">https://buildfaith.org/advent-in-a-box/</a>). And make sure all the children in Sunday School have the same bibles – SPARK last year – so that we can coordinate our lessons.

Patty Koplitz has created a draft video Sunday School lesson with greeting, bible story, discussion of story, and craft project, Lord's Prayer, and concluding prayer. We would like to confer with Naomi L, Teri R, and Carol Sp to work out the topics to cover and the timing for our materials and videos

**Re-entry Task Force** – new materials to help guide us have just been released by the Wisconsin Council of Churches: one printed and the other a webinar offered today "COVID Science for Churches" (that should be available to view in a couple of days) – I will send the links to the Council and the Re-entry Taskforce members ASAP.

Worship Comm and Technology Comm – looked at technology that would support our goals for worship, and would like to create a task force of members who would look into technology items in depth.

Synod Assembly is now a virtual assembly on Saturday, September 26. We are in the process of signing up and will be receiving more information later this month. Tom Galica, Sandy Last and I will be voting members. \$75.00 per voting member for registration.

### **Committee Reports**

Christian Action (Carol Spiegelberg) – feeding and serving 50-55 kids every day they serve. Some new people coming through – have the "drive through" flow really figured out. Red cart with special additional foods they can pick out for themselves.

Several neighbors who give produce out of their gardens, and gifts from neighbors to donate towards the last day (Aug 27) when giving out backpacks with school supplies. Just fantastic support from neighbors in the neighborhood. The Oshkosh Area Community Pantry has given us so much.

Not going to have the Chili Cookoff in September for God's Work Our Hands – but go to the OAC Pantry to help load and clean shelves and organize the food. **Friday, September 11 from 9 am to noon** – since we can't all be together in the Fellowship Hall this year.

We have a new freezer – paid for but not delivered yet – coming early September. Locked freezer – safe around kids. 14 cu ft freezer

#### **Congregational Life (Nancy Kreilick)**

Patty Koplitz is excited about the on-line Synod webinar meeting and created a ten-minute video projected for school age Sunday Schoolers – subject of Grace. She will make other videos for the High Schoolers in YMT. YMT group during confirmation meeting time – fellowship and mutual support. (Initially it will be virtual). Whatever we do, we be prepared to do virtually, in-person, or a blend, depending on the prevailing conditions with COVID-19. Create materials and programming that are flexible.

Webinar recommended: Emphasize relationship over all else – with each other and with God. Whatever we create we should foster growing in relationship with God, with each other and with trusted adults in the congregation.

**Education (Naomi Larkpor)** Talked with Patty about video, also picked the curriculum and recruiting teachers SPARK Digital curriculum for our children this year.
