Dear friends,

Yesterday, the pup and I were walking in our neighborhood and came upon a tree with very interesting bark.



It looks as if the smooth bark of the maple sapling had split from top to bottom - over and over - all around the tree to allow the tree to grow in width as well as in height. It made me wonder if the growth of this tree had happened very fast!

I have no idea if this is good or bad for that tree – perhaps it always grows like this - but it struck me that what we are going through right now is also forcing growth that divides and changes us in striking ways.

Right now, I think we <u>feel</u> like that tree looks - split by sudden change in our individual lives, and as a church, and as a society! And for us, the gaps ache.

The church itself was already in a time of profound change even before the pandemic of COVID-19 but the pandemic brought on even more changes that have tested us all right down to our roots.

The tragedies of COVID-19 and all its effects on our daily life not only added to our challenges, but the impact of the hurt and strain has fallen unevenly – much worse on the people who are poor or in groups disadvantaged by being in the minority.

The disadvantages have become unbearable and again we have been split – over and over again – as tragic events (such as what happened to George Floyd) call into question our basic systems of justice that we hoped would be dependable and righteous.

What do we do to get through this time? Not merely to survive, but to dwell faithfully and peaceably together?

One of our church leaders, Robin Steinke, the president of Luther Seminary, refers us to Jeremiah 29:4-7. I quote here verse 7: **But seek the welfare of the city** where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare. Right now, it feels as if we were in exile just as God's people were in Jeremiah's day.

Although most of us still live in the same places we did six months ago, everything in our lives has changed – suddenly we are unable to go to school, to work, to the store, or to church in the usual (comfortable) ways.

Our elders are confined to their living spaces as we try to protect them from COVID-19. We long to shake hands with friends, hug and kiss our loved ones, but we fear a deadly consequence. We are cut off from each other.

And it is as if we have been banished from the world we knew and now live in one that is so very strange.

During the exile, God's people were forced to leave all that they had known and they didn't know what to do. God's word to them was to pray for the new place where they found themselves – seek its welfare even though it was the place where enemies had dragged them!

God's promise just a few verses later in Jeremiah 29:11 is a favorite one: For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.

Trusting in God's promise, can we pray for the place and time in which we find ourselves?

Can we pray for those we don't yet understand but whom we are called by God to cherish and care for - to love all our neighbors as ourselves? Can we grow to walk alongside those who have been left out and hurt by systems that are broken and need to be changed?

#### Robin Steinke commented: **Perhaps God is calling us** to prayerfully seek the welfare of others in the midst of distress. Perhaps God is calling us to grow!

I believe that the health at the core of our life together is the unstoppable love of God and that our God promises to give us a future with hope.

In the strength of that, as his church, as his faithful people, let's grow our aching hearts to be a part of God's mission – by prayer and action to invite all people and all creation into a future with hope. May God bless you! Yours in Christ,

#### Highlights of Church Council Minutes September 8. 2020 – 7:00 PM by Zoom



**Attending via Zoom:** Amy Bargenquast, Warren Luce, Matt Moore, David Olson, Peg Olson, Teri Rucinsky, Carol Spiegelberg and Pastor Karen Jewell **Unable to Attend:** Jim Heidl, Andy Lang, and Naomi Larkpor.

#### Treasurer's Report Matt Moore addressed the reports

Total expenditures in August including payroll of \$27,204 (correcting 1 error for a \$53.77 check that should be \$70.00 for property) and total deposits of \$19,140.

**Balance sheet** – our base checking account is 21,663, the money market is \$100,225 (a reduction of \$34,999 since last month) but we are still in a good position. Current liabilities are \$150,111. Currently we are at a \$50,000 swing between the current liabilities and current assets. Projecting a close to break even by year end. The ADA project billings should be all completed by the end of October. There is about \$8,800 left in the special renovation fund. We have cut a check for \$1,000 to start to clear out the World Hunger Appeal account and a check was cut for ELCA Disaster fund to have that cleared by the end of December. We do plan to have the PPP loan forgiven at the end of the term and anticipate our internal debt being reduced to approximately \$10,000 at that time.

**Profit and loss budget for the month** – We took in \$16,606 this month, compared to \$139,022 for the year. The Synod benevolence will be reported in September as the check was cut 9/2/20. The Net income for the month of August was \$3,207, increasing our year to date net income to \$18,800, as compared to a budgeted loss year to date of (5,992). We are doing very well compared to budget.

**Profit and Loss for year to date** (Jan to August) we are up \$18,800 in our giving compared to the prior year at this time. Committee expenses are down \$3,600, operations expense is down \$1,500 despite a slight insurance increase. Year to date net income of \$18,800 is a significant swing from the prior year to date loss of (\$13,023)!!!!!

Giving has been very consistent, as church is starting up we hope for good things for the last quarter of the year. Motion carried for approval of Treasurer's report.

#### **Old Business**

- **Review Outdoor Summer Service:** There have been 3 outdoor in-person worship services in the picnic pavilion with between 11-29 people attending and including communion, followed by drive up communion with between 11-21 people. Online worship seems to have a lot larger attendance. We are keeping the in-person services simple with no singing per guidelines of the worship comm and task force. Both online and outdoor services are approximately 30 minutes long.
- **Planning for re-opening:** Considering a parking lot service for people to have the warmth of their cars, but the safety of the outdoors. For pedestrian participants, they can receive shelter in the entrance ways. We may be looking for an AM/FM receiver to project the sermon to the car radios.
- Virtual Dedication of our renovation: Teri Rucinsky will make a video of the dedication of the renovations in the next week, after all the pictures have been hung in the Lounge. The dedication is planned to be available either on Facebook, You Tube, and on DVD.
- **Comprehensive check-in with members by phone**: Looking for Volunteers to assist in reaching out to members. There is concern with the long winter ahead to make sure that people are staying connected. Possibly looking to establish small group "cottages" for prayers and connection amongst our members. Peg Olson volunteered to make some calls, and it was suggested to try to get the youth group involved as well.

#### **New Business:**

#### • Technology needs for worship:

- Am/FM Receiver Matt Moore looking into cost/implementation.
- Zoom Subscription We currently have 1 used for committees. Looking to add 1 additional zoom subscription for Sunday School/youth Group/Confirmation, etc. at a cost of \$150/year – motion carried to approve expenditure.
- Luther Hero Tree: The Luther tree in the backyard did not make it, and we are looking to replace this tree. Peg Olson has offered to use her gift to help in paying for the new tree. Chris Ziegler mentioned

calling it the Luther Hero Tree to honor our great heroes that we are celebrating now and grateful for. Motion carried to approve the gift of the Tree.

• Storage Policy for new kitchenette area: Looking for a policy to manage supplies for internal mission (Sunday school, etc.) versus external missions (AA, Girl Scouts, etc.) to keep space tidy but allow for access to items needed. Warren will be holding a daytime property meeting to address this and create a policy as well as a signup protocol for use of the Kitchenette area, the primary use will be for funerals and weddings. The main guideline will be to leave the area as you find it, meaning that all areas should be tidied up after each use. In addition, looking to have the space be used for "common use" items versus individual committee items.

#### **Pastor's Report**

**Confirmation** – On Sunday, Sept 6, Nora Stephan was confirmed outdoors at the pavilion, with family members present. Planning on completing the confirmation for 4 other Confirmands. Motion carried to approve Nora as a Confirmed member of our congregation. CONGRATULATIONS TO NORA STEPHAN and Welcome!

**Education** – Christian Education Zoom call on 8/31 with leaders from around the synod. We are and starting Sunday School and Confirmation in October to let the families adjust to the beginning of school and new challenges to their schedule and lifestyle! It also lets us create both virtual and physical materials for our students.

**East Central Synod of Wisconsin Assembly** will be held virtually on Saturday, **September 26** using LUMI with Zoom as the virtual platform. Sandy Last, Tom Galica and Pastor Karen are the voting members. This is a Bishop Election year. Current Synod benevolence is behind, they are reaching out for ideas/assistance to move them forward, including reaching out to our members to ask for their assistance directly to the Synod, or to notify members to identify their benevolence specific gifts. St Andrews will wait to see how their budget year ends up before committing to any additional Synod benevolence.

#### **Committee Reports**

#### **Christian Action (Carol Spiegelberg)**

Feeding of the Hungry Kids ran from July 3<sup>rd</sup> through August 27<sup>th</sup>. 2 meals were served each week for a total of 651 meals. On August 27<sup>th</sup> backpacks were handed out with school supplies, along with extra bags of food. We are so fortunate to be able to provide these meals. Freezer arriving on Wednesday September 9<sup>th</sup> and will be placed as storage issues are resolved for the mechanical room and janitorial supplies are moved. Friday September 11<sup>th</sup>, a group will be going to the Oshkosh Area Community Pantry to stock shelves as a thank you for their assistance in our Feeding of the Hungry Kids and as our God's Work Our Hands mission activity.

**Congregational Life (Nancy Kreilick)** S'mores cookout at picnic pavilion on Saturday September 19, 2020. 2<sup>nd</sup> grade – high school are welcome to come. We will maintain safe distance and yet be able to see each other and have fun! **Education (Teri Rucinsky/Naomi Larkpor)** Video lessons will begin in October, registration to be coming out soon. **Evangelism (Jim Heidl)** no report

**Fellowship (David Olson)** – Still considering an auction (possibly online) before year end to add to our Synod benevolence giving. He is asking to begin considering items for donation to the auction. Looking for ideas for virtual fellowship. Send ideas to Dave for the upcoming months.

**Property (Warren Luce):** Will need to explain usage/priority of ADA bathroom is for those in need of ADA facilities. Received a grant of \$13,500 for ADA, which brought the total of the special fund to \$47,897. The original budget was approximately \$40,000. Materials and labor are now coming in at \$37,000. We appear to have some excess funds that may need to be returned. However, there are some additional improvements that could be done which can apply some of these excess funds to protect the renovation. We will need to complete the report to the disability ministry to get clarity on usage of any remaining balances. Overall very pleased with the project progression and how it has turned out. Daytime Property meeting to be held on 9/17/20 at 1pm.

#### Stewardship/Discipleship (Andy Lang) no report

**Technology Committee:** possibly a new tablet to be purchased, but will address at Technology committee meeting. **Worship and Music (Peg Olson):** Only \$5 spent in August, however will be purchasing gluten free communion kits. **President's Report (Peg Olson)** Peg to chair Nomination committee. Other members include Jim Heidl, Teri Rucinsky, Darlene Bruce, Patty Koplitz, and Greg Egner. Peg will start calling people to establish a meeting time. Please consider people that you think might be interested in council. Matt did complete the UWO Scholarship form, but giving the office a heads up in case UWO calls for clarification on the form completion.



#### Anne Edison-Albright elected bishop of the ELCA East Central Synod of Wisconsin

The Rev. Anne Edison-Albright of Decorah, Iowa, was elected Sept. 26 to serve a six-year term as bishop of the East Central Synod of Wisconsin of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The election took place during an online synod assembly. Edison-Albright was elected on the fifth ballot, with 151 votes. The Rev. Jim Honig, pastor of Shepherd of the Bay Lutheran Church in Ellison Bay, Wis., received 133 votes. The bishop-elect has served as director of College Ministries and as college pastor at Luther College in Decorah since 2016. Edison-Albright served as pastor at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Stevens Point, Wis., from 2010 to 2016. She has also served as a hospital chaplain, a pastoral intern at the international congregation in Bratislava, Slovakia, and a summer missionary/English teacher in Chuzhou, China. Prior to rostered ministry, Edison-Albright was a high school English and English as a second language teacher. Edison-Albright received a B.A.in English and journalism from Michigan State University in 2003 and a M.Div. from Yale Divinity School in 2008. Edison-Albright's installation is scheduled for January 9, 2021. The Rev. Gerald Mansholt has served as bishop of the East Central Synod of Wisconsin since 2014.
