FROM YOUR PASTOR

Grace and peace to you from God our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ.

One of my favorite passages in St. Paul's writings is 1 Corinthians 12:14-18.

Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in a body, each one of them, as he chose.

There are several things that this passage lifts up. One is that each member of the church is important. Just as each part of the human body is important to its functioning, so is each member of the church important for its functioning. There are parts of our bodies that we cannot function without - like the heart, and lungs, and brain. There are other parts of our bodies that we function fairly well without - like a gallbladder, appendix, or tonsils. And there are other parts of our bodies that require special skills to compensate for their absence - like hearing, and sight. In our church we need everyone, with the gifts and abilities that God has given to each, to function and do the mission that God calls us to serve. Each person is important to the whole.

A second thing that this passage stresses is that, just as the parts of the body have different functions, we all have different functions. We are all given different talents, interests, and abilities. Put together, we make a body that functions well together. Sometimes when one part of the body over functions, that causes problems in another part of the body. People have told me that before they had knee surgery they favored that leg, and it caused hip problems. The same can happen in the church. But when everyone lives out their calling from God, and uses the abilities and gifts God has given them, the body works well together.

And a third thing that this passage tells us is that when we are working together we coordinate with one another and accomplish the purpose God intends for us.

As we begin the month of September, we see that there are lots of opportunities to gather for Bible Study, service to others, worship, and much more. There are opportunities to serve as lectors, ushers, worship assistants and communion assistants. We have the opportunity to serve our neighbors on God's Work. Our Hands. Sunday. Throughout the newsletter you will see opportunities to join together. As we all join together, using the gifts that God has given us, we will live out our mission and ministry.



Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a German Lutheran pastor, theologian and anti-Nazi dissident who was a key founding member of the Confessing Church. His writings on Christianity's role in the secular world have become widely influential; his 1937 book The Cost of Discipleship is described as a modern classic.

## **<u>Civic Life and Faith</u> <u>Discussion Sessions</u>**



The ELCA is developing a social statement on civic life and faith, the relationship of church and state, and related matters, as called for by the

2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

Social statements are the ELCA's primary documents to address significant social issues. They are intended to aid reflection, shape conscience and set forth the ELCA's teaching and policy on the major social issues and questions of contemporary life. Social statements are developed by task forces, using an established process of study and widespread participation across the church to guide theological and moral deliberation.

At this time the task force encourages you to study and give feedback on a draft version of the social statement. There are copies of the draft of "Civic Life and Faith" on the table in the narthex. We will hold two discussion sessions: Monday, 9 September at 10:00 am, and Tuesday, 17 September at 6:30 pm. Everyone is invited to read the document and join in a conversation session. Then you are invited to provide feedback to the task force through an online link. The feedback period will be open until Sept. 30, 2024.

## **School Kits For** Lutheran World Relief

We continue to gather

school supplies for the Lutheran Relief School Kits through Sunday, 8 September, when they will be assembled as one of our God's Work. Our Hands. Sunday projects. Providing School Kits helps children in impoverished communities get an education, which provides a better future for them and their families.

Each School Kit is to contain the following items:

- Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide or college ruled paper, approximately 8" x 10  $\frac{1}{2}$ "; no lose leaf paper
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on
- the other •
- One pencil sharpener
- One pair of blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- Five black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons
- One 2 ½ inch eraser

Drawstring backpack-style bags will be provided, thanks to a Thrivent Action Team grant. School supplies can be dropped off in the box on the table outside of the Fellowship Hall.

As summer draws to a close and we see children and youth getting ready for back-toschool, we can help children around the world with the supplies that they need for school and the future that lies ahead of them. Thank you!

Join ELCA World Hunger for a celebration of World Food Day and the 50th anniversary of ELCA World Hunger!


