PASTOR

Grace and peace to you from God our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ.

St. Paul reminds the church at Galatia that they are all one in Christ Jesus: Jews and Greeks, slaves and free, male

and female. Beyond societal distinctions, Jesus unites.

In Jesus' high priestly prayer, before his crucifixion, he prayed that all of his followers would be one as he and God the Father are one. Beyond societal and religious divisions, Jesus unites.

Jesus calls us to love one another. He calls us to love our enemies. And he calls us to forgive seventy times seven, which calls us to forgive without keeping track. Beyond divisions, hurt, and sin, Jesus draws us together.

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus tells the story of a Jewish man who is traveling when he is beaten and left for dead along a road. A priest and a Levite – good and faithful observant Jews – pass by on the other side of the road without offering assistance. And then a Samaritan – a member of a despised ethnic group – comes along and offers the assistance that leads to healing. Jesus asks which of them is the neighbor. In this story Jesus calls us to move beyond our sense of division, and even our prejudices, to care for all of God's people.

We are living in a time when there is more brokenness than unity in our country. A quick check of the news on television, radio, or internet highlights yet another hot issue that divides people in our nation, in communities, in neighborhoods, and in families.

In these weeks leading up to the election we are seeing the divisive issues growing and being exploited.

Dwelling in the midst of all of the stress, division, ramped up emotions, and all that we are experiencing in these days, we are the church of Jesus Christ. We have the opportunity to embody and model Jesus' desire – and the hope and promise – that we are one in Jesus. In the midst of different beliefs, we are one in Jesus. In the midst of different political positions, we are one in Jesus.

To help us focus on our unity, in the midst of the multiple divisions of our day, I have written some liturgy for the four weeks prior to the election. In the Order for Confession and Forgiveness, the Kyrie, the Great Thanksgiving, and the Benediction, we will be focusing on unity, caring for others, and seeking understanding, as we follow Jesus. This will begin on Sunday, 13 October.

It is my hope that these themes in worship will bring a focus to these days that brings peace to our spirits.

Highlights of Church Council Minutes

St. Andrew's Church Council Meeting to order at 7:02 p.m. on Tuesday, September 10, 2024. Those in attendance included: Pastor Karen Tews, Chris Ziegler, Carol Spiegelberg, Matt Moore, Sarah McAninch, Kathy Bellaire, and Greg Egner

Pastor Karen led opening prayer, which was followed by Dwelling in the Word based on Matthew 20:20-28.

Matt Moore presented the Treasurer's Report. Overall, the spending was lower than last year. *My Giving* and money market funds slightly increased assets. Church renovations resulted in lower liabilities than this time last year. Chris Ziegler made a motion to approve the financial reports as presented, Carol Spiegelberg seconded. Motion passed 7-0.

There were several items of Old Business. Pastor Karen's installation service will be Sunday, September 15th at 6:30pm. Refreshments will be served afterwards.

The floor buffing and waxing has been completed. An additional day was needed to complete the job. Thanks to everyone who helped.

This is "budget season." Narrative budgets are requested in two weeks to have the budget process complete by the end of October.

A \$500 donation was made to Miravida Living, to be used to provide air conditioners that can be loaned to residents of the Simeannas during the hot summer weather. Kathy Bellaire made the motion to approve; Chris Ziegler seconded the motion, which passed.

There were also several items of New Business. Pastor Karen and her daughter, Grace, are received as members of St. Andrew's.

Pastor Karen suggested providing "highlights" of the Church Council minutes in the Newsletter. The full minutes of the meeting will still be posted on the bulletin board outside of the office. This is to

increase the readability of what's going on at the church, and to reduce the number of pages in the Newsletter.

A date of Sunday, 17 November 2024 was set for a "Town Hall Meeting" for Pastor Karen to report on the Cottage Meetings. The meeting will be held in the sanctuary right after the church service. The meeting will be followed by the Pie Social.

We talked about forming a Stewardship Committee. The time and talents forms will be mailed with the quarterly reports. Everyone is asked to fill these out and return to church in the drop box. Pastor Karen Tews will be using these forms to plan the next steps for stewardship.

A Girl Scout Troop would like to use meeting space. The troop is made up of students from E Cook, Oak Lawn, and Martin Luther schools. They will meet on Wednesdays, every other week. Chris will reach out to them to request more information on time needed and the number of girls attending before it is approved.

The Pastor's Report showed the variety of ministries that Pastor Karen has been involved in: planning for the fall, Elmer Frank's funeral, getting to know some of the congregation members, and visiting some of the homebound church members. Plans were made for Confirmation Classes, the Wednesday noon Bible Study, the "Pop-up Adult Forum," and the discussion sessions on the ELCA draft Social Statement "Civil Life and Faith."

Pastor Karen attended the ordination and installation of Pastor Amy Penza at the Holden Lutheran Parish, Wautoma and the fundraising event at Miravida Living in Appleton. She participated in two online Continuing Education events: ministry in conflicted and divisive times and ELCA Social Statements.

She wrote liturgy that we will use for the four Sundays prior to the election. It brings a focus on unity, listening, compassion, kindness, and following Jesus' example of being inclusive of all of God's people. It lifts up seeking the Spirit's guidance as we discuss, deliberate, and live together.

Upcoming events include the Fall Theological Conference and the Oshkosh Conference Meeting.

Committee Reports:

The Christian Action/Fellowship Committee reported that God's Work, Our Hands was a great day and the Fire Department was thankful for all the toys, food, and blankets donated. Carol Spiegelberg suggested participating in the November Toy Drive. More information is needed to approve. The "Chili Cook-off" is planned for October 13th. Sign up and show us your special recipe!

The Worship and Music Committee continues to have a vacancy on one of the usher teams. Volunteers to usher or serve as assisting ministers or communion assistants are most welcome. We will be holding a fellowship with Pastor Karen on September 29 at 10:45 in the sanctuary for individuals currently in these roles. Anyone not currently serving in one of these roles but interested is invited to attend. The committee is still looking for volunteers to design the bulletin board. Materials are available at Church should someone be interested in taking on this project. Discussion occurred around whether or not to continue with a sign-in sheet as people enter the church or return to having a bulletin insert or a pew card available for worshipers to fill out during services, including any requests to meet with Pastor Karen. Further discussion is needed. We will be using "Now the Feast" as our liturgy in September and early October. Pastor Karen has developed a special liturgy for the month of October. Initial planning for the holidays has begun.

The next Church Council meeting will be Tuesday, October 8, 2024.

His writings on Christianity's role in the secular world have become widely influential; his 1937 book The Cost of Discipleship is described as a modern classic. 

Join ELCA World Hunger for a celebration of World Food Day and the 50th anniversary of ELCA World Hunger!


