Grace and peace to you from God our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. Lent has a rich history beginning in the early Christian church, in the second century CE. It was formalized at the Council of Nicea in 325 CE.

It echoes the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness following his baptism, when he was tempted by Satan.

Lent originated as a time of preparation and fasting before Easter. It may have originated with the practice of baptizing those who were new to the faith at the Easter Vigil. The practice of fasting in the 40 days before Easter became the norm, following Jesus' experience of fasting in the wilderness.

The beauty and spirituality of the Lenten season continues these 1700 years later. Christian churches and their members observe Lent as a time of preparation for Easter, spiritual growth, self-denial, and service.

Martin Luther urged that Lent be observed, not out of obligation or as a way to earn God's love - since we already have God's love and grace. Instead, he saw Lent as an opportunity for the strengthening of faith, the opportunity to show the fruits of our faith in service to others, and the time for the proclamation of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection.

St. Andrew's Lutheran Church offers a variety of ways to enrich and deepen your Lenten

journey. Lenten devotional booklets with prayers for each day of Lent are on the table in the narthex – please help yourself. Sunday worship will follow the theme "Symbols of Lent," with an opportunity to make that week's symbol after worship in the Fellowship Hall. Brenda Francis will be leading that opportunity. Midweek Lenten services will be shared with the other ELCA congregations in Oshkosh. We will host the first one, on 12 March, at 6:30 pm. The schedule for the rest of the services is included in the newsletter. And Pastor Karen will be providing a midweek Lenten devotion on Facebook each Wednesday beginning Ash Wednesday and concluding the Wednesday of Holy Week.

Lent is a deeply spiritual time, providing us the opportunity to remove some things from our lives - entering a time of wilderness - in order to make the space, the time, and the opportunity to grow our faith and our relationship with Jesus our Savior. I encourage you to choose a way to simplify your life, and accept this opportunity to grow in your relationship with Jesus this Lent.

# **Highlights of Council Meeting**



**Council** The Church Council met on Tuesday, 11 February 2025. Those in attendance included: Chris Ziegler, Sarah McAninch, Matt Moore, Peg Olson, Pam

Nemmetz, Mary Beth Roby and Pastor Karen Tews.

Chris called the meeting to order. Pastor Karen led an opening prayer. And the Council participated in Dwelling in the Word on Matthew 24:36-44.

Chris welcomed the new Council members, and members introduced themselves to the aroup. Elections were held for Church Council Officers with a nominating paper ballot. Chris Ziegler was elected as President; Peg Olson -Vice President; Sarah McAninch – Secretary; Matt Moore - Treasurer.

The Treasurer's Report was accepted. The offerings exceeded the expenses in January due to some large special gifts. It was noted that some expenses have increased since last year, and pray that the congregation will continue to cover all operating expenses for 2025.

Old Business included a review of the Annual Congregational Meeting.

New Business began with a discussion of the committees, and the designation of Committee Chairs from the Council members. Pam Nemmetz will co-chair the Christian Action Committee; Peg Olson will chair the Congregational Life Committee; Mary Beth Roby and Chris Ziegler will co-chair the Fellowship Committee: Matt Moore will chair the Finance Committee; Pastor Karen will cochair the Property Committee; there is no chair for the Stewardship Committee; Pam Nemmetz will chair the Worship and Music Committee; and Sarah McAninch will chair the Technology Committee.

Participation in the ecumenical VBS was discussed. Mary Beth and Matt agreed to attend the meeting to learn more about it.

A constitution review is needed before sending the constitution to the Synod Constitution

Committee for their approval. The Constitution Review Team will consist of Pastor Karen, Pam, Mary Beth, and Matt.

There was discussion about annual staff reviews. Pastor Karen will perform the annual reviews of the staff.

Pastor Karen presented her written report. There were no committee reports because none of the committees had met in the previous month.

The next Church Council meeting will be held Tuesday, 11 March 2025 at 7:00 pm. The meeting closed with prayer led by Pastor Karen and the Lord's Prayer.

#### Policies and Procedures Update

Because of some errors and mistakes that were discovered in some of the receipts for one

of our congregation's ministries, we are tightening up some policies and procedures for submitting receipts for reimbursement. And a couple of new policies have been approved by the Church Council because they are best practices. The goal is to prevent such mistakes from happening in the future, and to protect the integrity of the mission and ministry of St. Andrew's. If you have questions or suggestions about the policies and procedures, please see Pastor Karen.

- Reimbursable expenses are those used in the ministry of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church.
- Contributions for church ministries are not to be given to committee chairs or members. All contributions to the church – both monetary and gift cards – are to be made through the Sunday offering or the church office. This allows for accurate and transparent accounting of the receipts and the costs of the various ministries of the church.
- Gift cards are to be kept in the church office until signed out by authorized purchasers to be used for specific expenses. All gift cards are to be returned to the church office along with the store receipts.
- Purchases made using gift cards will not be reimbursed by the church.
  Purchases to be reimbursed must be made using cash, debit card, or credit card.
- Receipts submitted for reimbursement must be the original receipts, not copies.
- Items purchased for church ministries are to be made separate from personal purchases. When shopping for personal items at the same time as items for the church, please separate them and get separate receipts.

- If items are purchased for multiple ministries, an itemized list must be attached to the receipt listing which items are for which committee or ministry.
- All receipts must be reviewed by the pastor before being submitted to the treasurer.

## <u>Shrove Tuesday</u> Pancake Supper <u>4 March</u>

On Shrove Tuesday – the day before Ash Wednesday – we will be having a Pancake Supper from 5:00 – 6:30 pm. Join us as you are able, in the Fellowship Hall. It would help us to plan, and have enough food, if you would either sign up at church or give the church office a call if you are planning on coming. But registration is not required – everyone is welcome!

The menu includes: pancakes, sausages, and apple sauce.

The food for the Pancake Supper is provided through a Thrivent Action Team, so we extend our thanks to Thrivent Financial. A free-will offering will be received, which will support the work of the ELCA Hunger Appeal. The ELCA World Hunger Appeal is in its 51<sup>st</sup> year of feeding the hungry both in the United States and around the world. This is a very important ministry of the church, and is one way that we are part of Jesus' work of feeding the hungry.

#### The Story of Shrove Tuesday

In many Christian churches, a popular Shrove Tuesday tradition is to hold pancake suppers. Traditionally during Lent, Christians would give up rich, tasty foods such as butter, eggs, sugar and fat. Shrove Tuesday was the last chance to eat them – and pancake suppers were a good way to use up the eggs, butter, and fats before Lent began.

The name "Shrove" comes from the old word "shriving", which means to listen to someone's sins and forgive them. In Anglo-Saxon England, Christians would go to church on Shrove Tuesday to confess their sins and clean their souls. In other words, they would be "shriven."

In other countries, Shrove Tuesday has different names. In Germany, it's called Pis

called "Mardi Gras" from the French phrase meaning "Fat Tuesday."

And liturgically, Shrove Tuesday is also the day to burn the Palm branches from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration, in preparation for Ash Wednesday.



## Worship in Lent

In Lutheran churches it is traditional to put away the "alleluia" during the season of Lent, because "alleluia" is an expression of Easter joy. We will be burying the "alleluia" in worship on Transfiguration Sunday - 2 March. Throughout Lent we will refrain from singing "alleluia" in our liturgy and hymns. Instead of the usual Gospel acclamation

which begins "Alleluia. Lord to whom shall we go?", we will sing the Lenten Gospel acclamation which begins "Return to the Lord your God." On Easter morning our joy is expressed as we again proclaim "alleluia!"

In keeping with more somber Lenten worship, we will also refrain from lighting the Paschal/Christ candle during the season of Lent. The Paschal candle is a symbol of the resurrection. It is traditionally lit during the seven weeks of Easter, for baptisms, and for funerals, where it highlights Jesus' resurrection life. We light the Paschal candle each Sunday, celebrating Jesus' resurrection life. This year during Lent, we will observe the same practice of setting aside the "alleluia" as we set aside the lighting of the Paschal candle. Our Easter joy will be expressed as we again light the Paschal candle again on Easter morning.



### Ash Wednesday



On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with ashes, we acknowledge that we die and

return to the earth. At the same time, the ash traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.

Our Ash Wednesday service will be at 6:30 pm, March 5. There will be imposition of ashes for those who desire it, and Holy Communion.

## Midweek Lenten Worship

The Oshkosh area ELCA congregations are holding midweek Lenten services together, with four of the churches rotating the services and two of the churches holding their own services each week. The pastors will rotate preaching at the churches.

The theme of the Lenten services is "Dwelling in the Shelter of the Lord." The texts for the series are from the Psalms.

The schedule for the services:


5 March – Each church holds its own worship service; St. Andrew's service will be at 6:30 pm. Soup suppers will be an hour ahead of the service.
