Grace and peace to you from God our Father, and our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ.

Recently, at a meeting of the Oshkosh Area Collaborative Group (a leadership group representing the seven ELCA churches in Oshkosh), Pastor Jenn Pockat from the synod staff presented information about the life cycle of churches.

She presented a graphic that showed the four stages in the life cycle of a church. Churches begin in the "Growing" stage, which is vital but not sustainable. The next stage of a congregation is "Thriving," which is both vital and sustainable. The third state is the "Declining" stage. That is sustainable, but not vital. And the fourth stage is the "Struggling" stage, which is neither sustainable nor vital. The challenge, as a congregation moves from the "Thriving" stage, is to redefine, or redevelop, the congregation in order to keep it vital. When congregations move into the declining stage of the congregational life cycle, it is important that they look again at their mission and ministry, to refocus again. That can lead to rebirth. Congregations that continue to decline without assessing how to redefine, redevelop, and experience rebirth in their mission and ministry will most likely enter the struggling stage.


The conversation around the Congregational Life Cycle was thought-provoking to me, and I believe it was also thought provoking to the other congregational leaders at the meeting. I realize how easy it is, when things are going well, to continue to ride the wave and not assess where the future will take us. However, planning for the future is always important.

I remember an old Chinese proverb that says, "If we don't change direction we will end up where we are headed." That proverb has guided me in my work of congregation revitalization. And I believe it is important to heed those words in all circumstances.

I hope that reflecting on the Congregational Life Cycle will spur some conversations over the coming months. I encourage us to do the hard work of looking at our ministry, redefine our mission, and assess where we can redevelop and experience rebirth. There are ministry resources available from our synod to guide us in this work. And synod staff are also available to assist us.

I will post a copy of the graphic of the Congregational Life Cyle on the bulletin board in the narthex. The picture probably explains it far better than the description I have provided.

Highlights of Council Meeting May 12, 2025



The Church Council met on Monday, 12 May 2025. Those in attendance included: Chris Ziegler, Matt Moore, Sarah McAninch, Pam Nemmetz, Peg

Olson, Mary Beth Roby and Pastor Karen Tews. Gary Bruce attended as a guest.

Chris called the meeting to order. Pastor Karen led an opening prayer. Gary Bruce shared information from the ad hoc pews taskforce. The Council approved developing a funding campaign to raise the funds needed to replace the pews. The Building, Grounds, and Facilities Committee will work on reinforcing the pews to meet the immediate need, until funds are raised for replacing the pews.

The Council participated in Dwelling in the Word on Luke 16:19-31.

The Treasurer's Report was accepted. Offerings were less than expenses for March, because operating expenses have increased.

Old Business included Matt and Mary Beth sharing information from the ecumenical VBS. Information can be found in the newsletter.

Constitution Update: The Congregational Meeting to approve the proposed constitution will be Sunday, 1 June, following worship.

New Business included approval of dates for Pastor Karen's vacation plans. Also, it was approved to use Memorial Funds to purchase four home communion kits for church members to use to take communion to our homebound members. And, the new Church Council members will be trained so that they can be added to the Offering Counter teams.

The Pastor's Report and committee reports were heard. For the full Pastor's and committee reports, see the complete minutes that are posted on the bulletin board in the narthex.

The Building, Grounds, and Facilities Committee raised two issues for discussion and decision. Steve Last had an evaluation of the roofs done, and it is estimated that they

should be good for about five more years. The exception to that is the flat roof over the offices, lounge, and narthex. That is currently leaking, and at a special Church Council meeting the Council had approved repair of that roof this spring, for a cost not to exceed \$5,000. The Council needs to begin planning for the work that needs to be done on the remaining roofs, to be able to meet the financial expense. The second issue is that the parking lot needs to be patched, have the cracks sealed, be sealcoated and line striped. Steve got one bid for \$8095. The Council approved the work to be done at a cost not to exceed \$8095. Steve will get additional bids to check that we are getting the best price.

The next Church Council meeting will be held Monday, 9 June 2025 at 7:00 pm. The meeting closed with prayer led by Pastor Karen and the Lord's Prayer.

With How We Learn to Be Brave, she teaches us that being brave is not a singular occurrence; it's a journey that we can choose to undertake every day.


